About Symposium

The Wildlife Institute of India (WII) organized a symposium on 'the articles by individual authors in Prime Minister's Mann Ki Baat Reference to Wildlife Conservation on 28 April 2023 at the Institute. The 100th episode of this popular radio programme is to be aired on 30 April 2023.

Inspired by the PM's address on earlier Mann Ki Baat episodes, the scientists of the Wildlife Institute of India have published some papers on the issues raised by the Honourable Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi, in his radio programme 'Mann ki Baat'.

The scientists of WII presented these papers in the symposium on (i) Turtles and Tortoises in Assam and their Conservation – by Abhijit Das, Jason D Gerard and Bitupan Boruah (Mann Ki Baat Reference: 74th episode of Mann Ki Baat dated 28 February 2021), (ii) Goraiya of the sacred mountains - a comprehensive study of House Sparrow in the Uttarakhand Himalayas – by Renu Bala, Amarjeet Kaur, R. Suresh Kumar and Dhananjai Mohan (Mann Ki Baat Reference: 31st episode aired on 30 April 2017), (iii) Jalaj - Rivers and People Connect to realize the goals of Arth Ganga - by Ruchi Badola, Deepika Dogra, Saurav Gawan and Syed Ainul Hussain (Mann Ki Baat Reference: Mann Ki Baat, Episode 96 dated 25 December 2022), (iv) Wildlife Conservation in Arunachal Pradesh and its Challenges – by Priyanka Justa, Saurav Chaudhary, Salvador Lyngdoh (Mann Ki Baat Reference: Episode 31: 30 April 2017 Episode 56: 25 August 2019, Episode 84: 26 December 2021, Episode 74: 28 February 2021, Episode 85: 29 January 2022, and Episode 96: 25 December 2022), and (v) Tackling Wildlife Crime through Forensic Research: Efforts Spearheaded by Government of India at the Wildlife Institute of India - by Sandeep Kumar Gupta and Samrat Mondol (Mann Ki Baat Reference: 85th episode dated 30 January 2022).
